Christ is risen! He is risen, indeed! Alleluia! With this Easter greeting I hope you are also experiencing the great joy found in celebrating this Paschal Mystery. Thanks be to God, after a year in which many churches were closed due to the pandemic, we now are seeing more and more churches opening to celebrate the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass in person. We have curated special content related to the Eucharist, to help you welcome parishioners back for in-person worship and to prepare for the celebration of the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ (Corpus Christi) in early June (either Thursday, June 3, or Sunday, June 6). While the statistics about the belief in the Real Presence of Christ among regular Mass attendees are cause for concern (mentioned in newsletter), a renewed focus on this wonderful mystery can revitalize one's spiritual life and even the whole parish! Parish leaders who have encouraged their flock to participate in a small group based on an Augustine Institute program like *Lectio: Eucharist* by Dr. Brant Pitre or *Presence: The Mystery of the Eucharist*, with theologians, pastoral leaders, and priests talking about the importance of the Eucharist, have seen an increase in devotion for the Blessed Sacrament. May we continue to pray for each other.

The disciples who meet Jesus on the road to Emmaus finally perceive who Jesus is when he breaks bread and gives it to them. Sadly, many of today's Catholics do not recognize the real presence of Jesus in the Eucharist, even though our faith tells us that “the Eucharist is ‘the source and summit of the Christian life’” (CCC 1324, quoting *Lumen Gentium*, 11).

How can parishes combat this false belief and open their parishioners' eyes to the truth that Jesus Christ is present in the Eucharist?

Available in English and Spanish, this four-episode video series explores the truth and beauty of Christ's Real Presence in the Eucharist, from its




origins in Sacred Scripture to its profound role in the life of the Church and her members. It is the crescendo of the entire story of salvation.

Symbolon: The Catholic Faith Explained

This 20-part video series systematically presents the Catholic Faith for catechumens and candidates in parish RCIA programs. *Symbolon: The Catholic Faith Explained* illustrates the “big picture” of the Catholic Faith with the Creed as the guide.

Reborn: You, Your Child, and the Heart of Baptism

PARISH SPOTLIGHT

When Debbie Shearn—volunteer Bible study leader at St. Albert the Great Parish in Louisville—chose *Lectio: Eucharist* as a study, she had the results of a 2019 Pew Research Center survey in mind.

In that survey, only 31% of Catholics said that they believed that during Mass, the bread and wine become Jesus's Body and Blood.

Twenty-five women began *Lectio: Eucharist* in March 2020, coinciding with the shutdowns that resulted from the spread of the COVID-19 virus. The participants watched the *Eucharist* videos on formed.org and then communicated with one another via email and a private Facebook page.

“It was amazing,” Shearn said. “There was no Mass, and people were saying, ‘I can't wait for Mass again. I'm hungering for the Eucharist.’”

Katie Frandsen, the Bible study facilitator at St. Francis de Sales Parish in Lansing, Kansas, said that what she likes about *Lectio: Eucharist* is that it is “a nice combination of Scripture study and faith formation.”

Dr. Patrick Spiering, the FORMED coordinator at St. Vianney Parish in Brookfield, Wisconsin, said that after every session of *Lectio: Eucharist* at his parish, participants would say, “I did not know that,” about the biblical roots of the Eucharist and the Mass.

Dr. Kathy Johnson, the volunteer adult faith formation leader at Holy Spirit Catholic Church in Duncanville, Texas, echoed Spiering's point.

The early-on training and catechesis for many Catholics, Johnson said, was “inadequate. They're very motivated to learn more.”

Johnson's parish has used the LECTIO studies on Philipians, prayer, Mary, and the Eucharist.

“They're the best and highest quality out there,” Johnson said.

The LECTIO series, she said, is “aimed at the head and the heart. [Participants] are not only gaining knowledge; their hearts are being transformed and set on fire.”
