HOW CAN WE CONSOLE THE HEART OF JESUS?



The Church dedicates the month of June to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. Catholics commemorate the Solemnity of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus on June 24, the Friday after Sunday's Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ (Corpus Christi).

During June, and in a particular way on the day of the Solemnity, the faithful are called to ponder Jesus' divine love for all humanity. Jesus' boundless love, symbolized by his human heart, led him to accept death on the Cross to redeem us from our sins.

If our sins so hurt Jesus, how can we console his heart? How can we imitate his great love by our love for God and neighbor?

In *Consoling the Heart of Jesus*,

Source and Summit


In **Source and Summit**, a series of Bible Conference talks from the Augustine Institute, biblical scholars


LITURGICAL CALENDAR

To enrich your parishioners’ knowledge of and devotion to prominent saints who have June feast days, check out these resources on FORMED:



June 13 St. Anthony of Padua

St. Anthony: The Miracle Worker of Padua is a drama on the life of St. Anthony of Padua, one of the most popular saints in Christian history. Born in 1195, Anthony defied his father’s wish that he become a knight to answer God’s call, instead becoming a monk and follower of St. Francis of Assisi. Filmed in Italy, the movie beautifully portrays the power of Anthony’s preaching, his love for the poor, and the wonders of his miracles.



June 17 St. Albert Chmielowski

Based on a play by Karol Woytyla (Pope St. John Paul II), **Our God’s Brother** celebrates the 19th-century Polish artist and painter whose encounters with homeless and outcast beggars triggered his passion to help the poor. Abandoning his painting, Albert became a monk, founding a new religious community, later known as the Albertine Brothers.



June 22 Sts. John Fisher and Thomas More

Martyrs of the English Reformation are portrayed in **Faith of Our Fathers**. Risking fines, prison sentences, exile, and death, brave men and women clung to their faith during persecutions under King Henry VIII and Queen Elizabeth I.

Fr. Marcus Holden and Fr. Nicholas Schofield embark on a journey to discover more about these heroic figures and their significance for Catholics today. From the lives of well-known saints and other Catholic heroes, *Faith of Our Fathers* brings the inspiring story of the English Martyrs to life.

CONTENT SPOTLIGHT

In the month of June, we celebrate the Feast of Corpus Christi, the Body and Blood of Christ.

Last year the Augustine Institute dedicated an entire Bible Conference to the Eucharist: The Source and Summit Bible Conference. Because the Eucharist is the source and summit of our faith, this Bible Conference is an excellent resource to refocus our prayer and meditation throughout the month of June.

"Even among Catholics who are regularly in the pews," Clemens said, "a lot of people haven't encountered the great joy of that truth—that Christ comes to us in every Mass."

Comprised of three half-hour talks by Dr. Brant Pitre, Dr. Tim Gray, and Dr. Mary Healy and followed by a "very rich" half-hour panel discussion among the three, the Conference highlights "the centrality of the Eucharist to the Good News," said Clemens.

In addition to exploring the interplay of the Old and New Testaments, Clemens said, "All three talks are rooted in the Gospels."

The Source and Summit Bible Conference helps Catholics understand why they are at Mass—to encounter Christ "in Word and sacrament," Clemens said.

While it's possible to watch the talks privately, Clemens suggests that "there's a lot of value in doing it alongside others—family, friends, kids, and parents."

And although bingewatching is trendy, viewing each half-hour of the Conference separately aids in absorbing and understanding.

"Let it be the topic of conversation at dinner or right after watching, with a prayer of thanksgiving," Clemens said.

In preparation for Pentecost on June 5, invite your parishioners to set aside two minutes per day for nine consecutive days to pray the **Pentecost Novena**. Join Dr. Ben Akers and Taylor Kemp as they pray the original novena with the apostles, asking each day to be blessed with one of the fruits of the Holy Spirit: charity, joy, peace, patience, kindness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control, and goodness.

"Come, Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful and enkindle in them the fire of your love. Send forth your Spirit and they shall be created, and you shall renew the face of the earth. O God, who by the light of the Holy Spirit did instruct the hearts of the faithful, grant that by the same Holy Spirit we may be truly wise and ever enjoy his consolations, through Christ our Lord. Amen."

This season, however, is by no means ordinary; filled with many memorials and solemn feasts, such as Trinity Sunday, Pentecost, and the memorial of the Immaculate Heart of Mary, the Church's Easter joy continues into this season.
