This October, we celebrate Respect Life Month—a time dedicated to recognizing and raising awareness for issues concerning the dignity of the human person.

Pope Francis writes that "every human being is the object of God's infinite tenderness, and he himself is present in their lives" (*Evangelii Gaudium*, 274). We are called to recognize this inherent truth and see the value of each person. However, the times we live in promote a culture of death rather than life. This fails to realize the dignity of others and takes away their right to life.

In 2023, the USCCB calls for Respect Life Month to be a time of "radical solidarity"—that is, authentic companionship and support for those who face the terrible choice given by our culture between



life and death. As disciples of Christ, we are called to care for these individuals while also guiding them to see the dignity of life within them and those they care for. As mothers face unexpected pregnancy and families consider physician-assisted suicide or euthanasia for their loved ones, the Lord asks us to receive them into our hearts and share his love with them.

The answer to these issues is not in arguments and ostracizing; rather, it is in intentional accompaniment and genuine conversations. *Into Life: Love Changes Everything* on FORMED is a great starting point for educating ourselves and our parishes in beginning the conversation on life. This online formation program contains 12 videos detailing how to build a culture of life and solidarity through informative talks and opportunities for prayer and reflection. A collaborative effort between the Sisters of Life, the McGrath Institute for Church Life at the University of Notre Dame, and CampCampo Films, this series is perfect for educating your flock and inviting others into the dignity of life conversation.

As we enter Respect Life Month, consider bringing *Into Life* into your parish and promoting a culture of life and radical solidarity.

Cultivating Catholic Feminism | The Catholic Woman

"In transforming culture so that it supports life, women occupy a place, in thought and action, which is unique and decisive. It depends on them to promote a 'new feminism' which rejects the temptation of imitating models of 'male domination,' in order to acknowledge and affirm the true genius of women in every aspect of the life of society, and overcome all discrimination, violence and exploitation." — St. John Paul II, *Evangelium Vitae*, 99)

With these words, St. John Paul II set the tone for the Church's response to the world's culture of death. As Christians, we are called to see and recognize that God created each person in his image and likeness. Through this, personal worth is found in a person's very existence—not in beauty, intelligence,

usefulness, or anything else.

The rich theological vision of the Church is, in part, to create an authentically Catholic feminism that fully understands the role of women and the value of life. By reshaping the concept of feminism, we can reshape the concept of the human person and a person's dignity.


